Geography

Name, locate and describe some major cities in the UK.

Describe the type and characteristics of settlement in an area or region (city, town, village, hamlet etc)

Classify, compare and contrast different types of geographical feature. Geographical features created by nature called physical features and geographical features created by humans called human features.

Name and locate significant mountains and rivers within the UK.

Explain the physical processes that cause earthquakes and volcanic eruptions.

Use the eight points of a compass to locate a geographical feature or place on a map.

Citizenship/ PSHE:
